WELCOME

2025 WAS ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL YEAR FOR THE FOUNDATION, WITH THE HEALTH OF RECREATIONAL CRICKET IN A SOLID PLACE ACROSS THE COUNTY.



The Foundation continues to be held in highest regard by the ECB and by stakeholders both locally and nationally.

There were many highlights in 2025, but I would like to pay particular attention to our Sussex Disability Cricket teams who continue to excel. Our Sussex VI Sharks completed the 'Double' which included a thrilling victory over Northamptonshire in the BCEW Cup at The 1st Central County Ground, a day which made lifelong memories for both sets of players. Our D40 teams continue to produce players both for the Toyota Disability Premier League and for England. Liam O'Brien and Alfie Pyle both featured in the historic pan-disability series vs. India, with both playing a starring role in England's series victory. The year ended with Liam, Alfie and young spinner, Jake Vosloo being called up for the tour to India at the start of 2026. For me, this is what the Foundation is about, creating a passion for cricket, changing lives and helping to fulfil people's ambitions.

As we look ahead to 2026, our biggest priority is state school cricket where we will be launching our ground-breaking secondary school programme, Breaking Boundaries. Significant investment has been secured to create an ambitious programme that will revolutionise state school cricket in Sussex and link into our already successful 10-year partnership with the Brighton Aldridge Community Academy. Over the next 4 years, 8 state school hubs will be created with all schools receiving dedicated curriculum time coaching, extra-curricular activity and funding towards facilities, kit, equipment and training for teachers. The hubs will also link to local clubs, which will help strengthen, sustain and transform the recreational game.

As I sign off, I would like to thank my team for all their continued hard work and dedication to the Foundation. They are the ones who deserve enormous credit for all our successes, as they are the ones on the ground delivering our programmes, projects and initiatives to help continue growing the game and making it accessible to all across Sussex. I would also like to thank my Trustees, our Patrons, our Community Partners and to the Executive Team at Sussex Cricket for their continued support.

I look forward to seeing you during 2026, which is shaping up to be an exciting year on and off the pitch for Sussex Cricket.

STORY OF OUR YEAR



JANUARY

Our year began with **Dean Wilson Solicitors LLP** named as the new Sussex Cricket League sponsors & valued community partners of the Foundation. Our community coaching team also **resumed schools coaching across the county**, through the Chance to Shine and Lord's Taverners funded programmes.

FEBRUARY

In February, we delivered an engaging mix of community activities, including the county **Lord's Taverners Table Cricket Festivals**, Chichester & Worthing Sporting Memories clubs met for a special new-age kurling event, and we hosted a **Chance to Shine Street Cricket qualifier** competition.

MARCH

March saw various Primary & Secondary School Indoor Finals take place. We also marked **International Women's Day** with our first ever **female-only Walking Cricket event**, in the Indoor School at The 1st Central County Ground. In an effort to grow female participation within Sussex based Walking Cricket clubs.



APRIL

Following the qualifiers, the annual **SCF Street Cricket county competition** took place at Southwick Leisure Centre. We delivered a series of Primary School Skills Festivals, with the help of Sports Leaders from Secondary Schools. The Sussex Seniors also won the Malta Seniors Cricket Festival. Finally, our incredible **Brighton Marathon team raised close to £5,000** for their efforts on Marathon weekend!

MAY

May was jam-packed, with the **SCF Charity Golf Day** held at East Brighton Golf Club, our flagship event **DIScoverABILITY Day** once again saw 750+ participants descend on Hove for a day of inclusive multi-sports activity and we held the inaugural **Disability T10 Cup** welcoming teams from Hampshire, Surrey & Essex down to Hove.

JUNE

With the summer in full-swing, Hove played host to the **Lacuna Sports Women's Soft Ball Festival** and our annual **Schools' Day**, welcoming over 2200 school children to the ground to watch the England Men's U19s in action versus India. We also made the trip down to West Wittering Beach for another Primary School **Beach Cricket Festival** in the sun!



JULY

A busy July saw our Primary & Secondary School County Finals take place. Sporting Memories clubs and grounds volunteers from local Cricket clubs were invited to Hove for a day at the Cricket. We launched a series of **LGBTQ+ tasters sessions** at Sixes Social Cricket Bar and an SCF team took on the Lord March's XI in the **Alan Lee Memorial Match, part of the Goodwood Festival**.



AUGUST

August saw another first, as we hosted the **Disability Hundred competition at Arundel Castle Cricket Ground**, during the Rathbones Arundel Festival Week. We also reached the culmination of the various Women's & Girls' Leagues and Cups. The annual Workplace B'Ashes fundraiser took place and the **Dean Wilson Sussex Cricket League T20 Finals Day** was held at Hove.

SEPTEMBER

The **Sussex Sharks VI team** continued their dominance by winning the **BCEW Heindrich Swanepoel Primary Club Cup** to add to their National League title. The final weekend of League Cricket played out confirming a Premier Division double for Horsham CC who won the Dean Wilson Sussex Cricket League and Sussex Women's Cricket League titles.

OCTOBER

October was a month of celebration as **The Cricket Collective Awards winners were announced**. The Disability teams picked up various awards at the Sussex Cricket Awards and the Dean Wilson Sussex Cricket League Awards were celebrated by over 400 guests at The Grand Brighton. We also held a wonderful Diwali celebration.

NOVEMBER

In November, a number of the Sussex Cricket Men's squad paid a visit to Sporting Memories clubs across the county, with members thrilled to rub shoulders with the players. The Foundation's flagship State Secondary School programme, **Breaking Boundaries**, began with coaching delivered in the initial four partner schools, in partnership with the Focus Foundation.

DECEMBER

December saw a number of festive celebration events including the annual **SCF Christmas Carol Evening** which had a record attendance! The ever popular **Sporting Memories Christmas Lunch** and **Walking Cricket Christmas event** also provided plenty of festive cheer for members of our Ageing Well programmes.

LACUNA SPORTS FESTIVAL

A CELEBRATION OF GROWTH & INCLUSION IN WOMEN'S CRICKET

On Sunday 22nd June 2025, the Sussex Cricket Foundation hosted a vibrant Women's Soft Ball Cricket Festival at The 1st Central County Ground in Hove.

Run by dedicated staff from the Sussex Cricket Foundation alongside volunteer club umpires, the festival took place in the morning, creating an exciting lead-in to the Sussex Sharks Women's Vitality Blast League 2 match that afternoon.

The event drew 12 clubs and brought together over 100 women and girls. Participants enjoyed friendly, competitive matches on the iconic outfield, showcasing the fun and accessible nature of Soft Ball Cricket.

The day culminated in a thrilling final where Three Bridges CC emerged victorious, lifting the trophy after defeating Lewes Priory CC. The matches highlighted skill, teamwork, and enthusiasm across all teams, with players of varying experience levels competing in a supportive environment.



Many players and supporters chose to stay on after the festival to cheer on the Sussex Women's team in their Vitality Blast fixture, bridging grassroots participation with elite-level Cricket and fostering a sense of belonging within the wider Sussex Cricket community.

The festival was proudly sponsored by Lacuna Sports, a female-specific sportswear brand dedicated to empowering women in sport. Their support highlighted the event's focus on female participation and offered clubs and players high-quality, tailored kit.

The event reflects the rising popularity of Women's Soft Ball Cricket in Sussex. The county-wide league now includes roughly 40 clubs across 10 local divisions each year, providing a welcoming, structured entry point into the game.

Soft Ball Cricket offers an inclusive, low-pressure environment that prioritises fun, skill-building and social connection, while creating clear pathways to hard ball formats via the Sussex Slam or Division 2 of the Sussex Women's Cricket League.

Adding a personal and heartwarming dimension, one of the standout stories from the day came from a mother and daughter who played together in the same team. Their shared experience captured the inclusive spirit of the festival:

"I'M STILL BUZZING, THE MOST AMAZING DAY. HAVING THE OPPORTUNITY TO STEP ON TO THE TURF AT THE COUNTY GROUND WITH MY THREE BRIDGES CRICKET FAMILY AS WELL AS BAT WITH MY DAUGHTER. FANTASTIC."

The Lacuna Sports Festival shows just how far Women's Cricket in Sussex has come. With an elite venue, great sponsorship and some lovely real stories from players, it proves Soft Ball Cricket is thriving, pulling in players new and old and opening doors for the next generation.

CASE STUDY

BETHANY TAGG, METRO BANK CHAMPION OF GIRLS' CRICKET

Bethany Tagg has been the driving force behind the rise of girls' cricket at Buxted Park Cricket Club, a club steeped in history since its establishment in 1867.

As the golden thread connecting every aspect of this initiative, Beth has made history by leading the first three girls' cricket matches ever played at the club.

From attending winter planning meetings as the Women's & Girls' Lead to speaking enthusiastically at a pizza and cricket introduction evening, Beth's commitment has never faltered. She has been a constant presence throughout the weekly sessions she has led since April, creating a welcoming and empowering environment for all.

Her efforts have led to an incredible transformation at the club, with 20 girls now actively participating in the sport many of whom had never played cricket before. Beth's ability to engage, motivate, and foster a sense

of belonging has made her a true role model, and her dedication to growing girls' cricket deserves recognition.

So much so that Beth won the 2025 Metro Bank Champion of Girls' Cricket award. Her work has not only championed participation but has also ensured the sustainability and growth of girls' cricket at Buxted Park Cricket Club for years to come.

Beth was also part of the first-ever cohort of Sussex Cricket Coaching badge holders, a landmark moment for Coach Development in the county. Becoming the first female coach to achieve the qualification in the process.

The programme, designed and led by Paul Farbrace (Sussex CCC Head Coach) and Chris Fox from the Sussex Cricket Foundation's Coach Development team, brought together 12 established and experienced coaches.

The aim was to enhance their technical insight, coaching skills, and knowledge, supporting their continued development and raising the overall quality of Cricket coaching across Sussex.

RAY'S STORY **FINDING FRIENDSHIP THROUGH SPORTING MEMORIES**

After losing his wife, Ray felt the silence of his home grow heavy. Then the local Chichester Observer featured a new Sporting Memories group run by the Sussex Cricket Foundation.

A photo showed a dozen people chatting around a table. Ray, a lifelong sports fan, thought it looked welcoming. He decided to go.

The club had only just started, three members that first day, but they greeted him warmly. That small beginning changed everything.

Now the Chichester Sporting Memories club has fifteen lively members, guided by volunteers Bob & David. Meetings officially run every Monday 10am to 11:30am, but everyone arrives early and stays past noon, full of banter and laughter. You have to give it and take it and Ray gives as good as he gets.

The group has become a close-knit community. They check on each other, share phone numbers, and meet up outside of

meetings for golf, horse racing, and more. They've enjoyed friendly competitions: a nine-hole golf day at Hunston with coffee and a trophy, a curling match against Worthing (Chichester won), and plans for ten-pin bowling and darts next.

Sport is the glue – football, rugby, motor racing, Scottish football, golf; there's always something to debate from the weekend. The banter is relentless (Bob's unlucky England trips abroad are favourite targets), complete with yellow and red cards for when it gets too cheeky.

What began as a way to get out of the house has become a lifeline: sport, friendship, and endless light-hearted fun. The club feels like family and Ray is glad he walked through the door.

CASE STUDY

TRANSFORMING CRICKET AT BARNHAM PRIMARY SCHOOL

Cricket at Barnham Primary was once restricted to a six-week pre-Term 6 programme for a small group of Year 6 pupils, focused only on the county Primary School competitions, with low overall participation.

Since Kate Geraets took charge, she has launched a free, year-round before-school club for Years 3/4 and 5/6. Sessions run regardless of weather, with safe adaptations on frosty or slippery days (e.g. walking-only or non-running skills).

She has introduced creative, inclusive activities: Dice Cricket to teach rules and scoring indoors, Snowball Indoor Cricket before Christmas, and the children's own Rugby-Tennis-Cricket catching game. Sessions are fluid and child-led, driven by what the pupils want to improve.

Children receive a Dice Cricket pack (rules and dice) to take home for the summer holidays. In summer, two dedicated pitches are available at breaktimes, managed entirely by the children.

The school maintains strong links with Eastergate CC and promotes local clubs for continued play outside school. The highlight is the Barnham Ashes: a whole-school daytime event where Year 6 play the staff, watched by everyone, with Year 5s leading crowd support using mini-whiteboard scorecards.

Cricket is now extremely popular, with a waiting list to join. From September 2025, the club expands from 20 to 30 children per age group.

BUILDING FUTURES

SUPER 1s JOIN WEBTRENDS OPTIMIZE FOR WORK EXPERIENCE

The Super 1s programme, funded by the Lord's Taverners and delivered locally by the Sussex Cricket Foundation uses inclusive Soft Ball Cricket to empower young people with disabilities, building confidence, life skills, and pathways to opportunities beyond sport.

Webtrends Optimize, a sponsor of Sussex Cricket's Disability Pathway, hosted participants from the Super 1s programme for a tailored work experience placement at their office. The day included personal development workshops, employability sessions, and real-world exposure to a professional workplace environment.

Gabriel, one of the Super 1s participants, joined the work experience day and immersed himself in the office activities. He engaged enthusiastically with the team, took part in hands-on sessions exploring

workplace tools and routines, and gained practical insights into professional life. This experience boosted his confidence and gave him a clearer vision of future career possibilities, highlighting how such inclusive opportunities can transform aspirations for young people with disabilities.

JAKE'S STORY

A BREAKTHROUGH SEASON FOR SUSSEX'S RISING DISABILITY CRICKET STAR

At just 16, Sussex left-arm wrist spinner Jake Vosloo has enjoyed a breakthrough year across the national Disability Cricket pathway.

Playing recreationally for Mayfield 1st XI, Vosloo impressed in the ECB Inter-County National Disability Premier Competition, taking 11 wickets and showcasing remarkable control for his age.


His performances earned him a late call-up to the Hawks for his first Toyota Disability Premier League season, where he immediately looked at home. England Mixed Disability captain Callum Flynn praised the young spinner's maturity, noting:

Vosloo's rise continued with selection for the England Lions, followed by his England Mixed Disability debut in a friendly against the University of Worcester alongside Sussex teammate Alfie Pyle.

He has now been named in the England Men's Mixed Disability squad for their 2026 tour of India. If he features, Vosloo will become the youngest player ever to represent England Mixed Disability Cricket at international level.

A rare talent with huge potential, Jake Vosloo's 2025 season marks him as one of the brightest emerging players in Disability Cricket.

LEADING THE WAY IN PARTNERSHIP-DRIVEN DISABILITY CRICKET

Shortlisted for the ECB Impact of Cricket Awards 2026 in the Partnerships Category – the Sussex Cricket Foundation led the way in Disability Cricket delivery. The citation below explains our work:

In 2025, Sussex Cricket Foundation delivered one of the most ambitious and impactful disability cricket programmes in county cricket history. Anchored by its flagship **DIScoverABILITY Day** and two pioneering competitions, the **Disability T10 Cup** and the inaugural **Disability Hundred**, Sussex has redefined what Disability Cricket can look and feel like.

The **Disability T10 Cup**, staged at the 1st Central County Ground, brought together four D40 squads (Sussex, Surrey, Hampshire, Essex) for a professional-standard tournament featuring elite performance, live broadcast, commentary, and media coverage.

Players described the experience as “life-changing” and “historic,” reflecting the event’s athlete-centred approach.



Later on in the summer, the **Disability Hundred at Arundel Castle** extended innovation with a fresh format during the Rathbones Arundel Festival of Cricket.

These achievements were powered by deep partnerships with the ECB, Lord’s Taverners, sponsors, schools, charities, and over 150 volunteers. DIScoverABILITY Day welcomed 750 participants with SEND, supported by ParalympicsGB, Sight Support Worthing, GB Wheelchair Cricket, and more, creating an inclusive & inspiring environment.

WITH OVER 5,000 ONLINE VIEWERS, PROFESSIONAL FACILITIES, AND GROWING PARTICIPATION, SUSSEX HAS ELEVATED DISABILITY CRICKET FROM AN ADD-ON TO A CELEBRATED, VISIBLE PART OF ITS IDENTITY.

This programme exemplifies vision, collaboration, and innovation, setting a national benchmark for inclusive sport.
